


This report describes the social identities reported by students in Grades 4 through 12 who completed the census

## Indigenous Identity



#### **Religious or Spiritual Affiliation**

The DPCDSB student census asked students to indicate their religious affiliation from a preletermined set of options. Students could select as many religious affiliations as needed, and/or type information into an open text box to describe themselvesFigure 4 (below) summarizes the religious affiliations reported by students.



#### **Gender Identity**

As a Catholic education adstitution, DPCDSB is aware of the Church's position on gender; however, the sitions of the Church and the Ontario Human Rights Commissing arding gender differ. Regardless of the different positions on gender, DPCDS cognizes that everyone's human dignity must be respected and protected chool districts, including Catholic ones, are required to ask students about their gender identity Figure 5 (below) summarizes the gender identity data reported by participating students.

Approximately 98% of students selected a cisgender identity, split nearly equally between boys and girls. A total of 419 secondary students and 488 elementary students reported acisagrender identity using the open text field in the census. The most common-cisgender identity reported by students was rebimary, followed by genderfluid and gender negonforming.

#### **Sexual Orientation**

As a Catholic educational institution, DPCDSB is aware of the Church's position on sexual orientation. At the same time, sexual orientation is also one of the protected grounds of the Ontario Human Rights, Code meaning it is against the law to discriminate against or harass someone based ortheir sexual orientation.
