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BACKGROUND

Ontario Regulation 357/06Honoraria for Board/Memberssets out the method for calculating the limits on honoraria paid under section 191 of the ucation ActThe honoraria, in respect of any year of the term in office, shall consist of the following components: base amount, enrolment amount, attendan amounts and distance amounts.

DISCUSSION

There have been no changes to the base amount for trustee honoraria. For the term of office starting November 15, 2024 to November 14, 2025, the only change to trustee honoraria will be the impact of enrolment changes.

The components of the trustee honoraria include:

x Base Amountt There is no change to the base amount of \$5,900. An additional \$5,000 is added for the chair and \$2,500 for the vicehair.

The Policy also tates that trustees shall be paid weekly by direct deposit based on 1/26 of the established honorarium.

BACKGROUND

Ontario Regulation (O. Reg.) 41/4Board Borrowing, Investing and Other Financial Mattersder the Education Actrequires a school board to bring forward investment information to the Board of Trustees.

As prescribed und. Reg. 41/10the DufferinPeel Catholic District School Bota DPCDSB) may only invest in specific securities, as outlined in Part IV of the regulation, subsections 1 to 5.

During the 202æ024 fiscal year, DPCDSB continued to borrow money to meet operating expenditure obligations. Borrowing was necessary as sulfe of the deficit financial position of the DPCDSB, no accumulated surplus funds and timing differences between our collection of revenues from municipalities and the province, and expenditure payment schedules.

DISCUSSION

DPCDSB has borrowing resolution operating and capital needs as follows, approved by the Board of Trustees:

\$150 million t Temporary Borrowing Resolution related to operating needs \$65 million t Temporary Borrowing Resolution related to capital needs

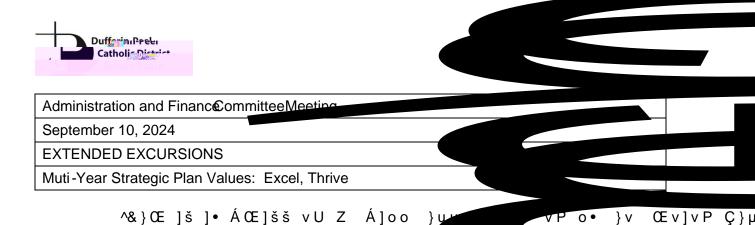

DPCDSB hasiae of credit with the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (CIBC) for \$60 million. This was temporarily increased during the year t80\$million to allow for cash flow fluctuations around the purchase and sale of board propertiesollowing the receipt of all proceeds to be property sales, the line of credit will revert back to \$60 million.
